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| | | An undocumented immigrant can usually get a legal visa if he/she has enough money. |
| | | Coming to the U.S. to work is the fastest way to get here legally. |
| | | Most of the visas given every year are to help citizens reunite with their family members. |
| | | An asylum seeker is a non-technical term for someone who is afraid to go back to their country of origin. |
| | | Local police officers are not trained to enforce federal immigration law. |
| | | Immigrants who are picked up by ICE get a court-appointed attorney. |
| | | If you are born here, you are a U.S. citizen, even if your parent is undocumented. |
| | | Immigrants are motivated to come to the U.S. because they can easily access the social safety net: food stamps, welfare checks, housing benefits. |
| | | ICE cannot legally enter a church, school, or hospital. |
| | | In Michigan, we have never allowed undocumented immigrants to drive legally. |
| | | An immigrant can, after a short period of being in the U.S., file for their extended family members to come join them. |
| | | In 2015, undocumented immigrants paid \$23.6 billion in income taxes, though they will not be able to receive Social Security or Medicare. |
| | | DACA was an executive order that President Obama issued, which gave permanent legal status to Dreamers, who came to the U.S. as children but were undocumented. |
| | | Undocumented immigrant children can legally attend public schools. |
| | | Immigrants are less likely than native-born U.S. citizens to commit crimes. |
| | | Coming to the U.S. as a refugee or asylum seeker is the quickest way to come, making it a viable option for terrorists seeking to harm Americans. |
| | | Until 1965, there was a quota for the number of immigrants who could come to the U.S. based on what country they came from; the vast majority of those visas were for those from Western and Northern Europe. |
| | | 60% of immigrants in the U.S. today are Christians. |
